Oxford 4-H Quilting Club – Magic Blocks! – by Grace Piper

The first meeting of the Oxford Quilting 4-H club took place at Ye Olde Fabric Shoppe in Stratford. At this meeting we learned about fat quarters, fabric lines, and colour theory. We then purchased our fabric for our projects. The club provided us each with gift cards to help cover some of the cost. For our projects we could either make a wall hanging, table runner or lap quilt out of the "Magic" blocks we created throughout the project. The next 5 meetings took place at the Village Manor in Tavistock on Monday nights. At meeting two we sorted all the fabric we bought at Ye Olde Fabric Shoppe by colour and shade. Next, we cut up the fabric using an outline given to us by our club leader, Linda. We learned how to properly use a rotary cutter, quilting rulers and cutting mats and how to cut straight at this meeting. At meeting three we made two blocks for our quilt. One was simple and tested our ability to follow directions while the other was more difficult and taught us to match seams. They both turned out very beautiful and look great on our finished projects. At meeting four we sewed more blocks including an arrowhead block and a disappearing four patch block using 2 different methods, we also learned how to square blocks to make them easier to work with in the future. At meeting five we learned about parliamentary procedures from Katherine. Specifically, about motions. It was very informative, and I learned a lot about why we have motions in 4-H. We then practised by making motions on what we should have for lunch at meeting six Sewing Day which would take place from 10-3 pm. We learned how to make the last of our blocks and took the ones we didn't finish home with us. At meeting six we wrapped up the Oxford Quilting 4-H project. At this meeting we learned how to sandwich our quilt blocks, connect our blocks and finish our quilt projects. We stopped for lunch midway through when the meeting took place from 10-3pm. We had decided to have Subway for lunch, and it was very good. We then finished the club and whatever we hadn't completed we took home to finish and show our families. Thanks to our club leaders - Linda Humphrey, Katherine Grieve, Marilyn Lichti and Janice Kyle (who shadowed our meetings).

Youth Adventure Camp (YAC)—report by Grace Piper (presented at Oxford 4-H Awards Night)

Hello everyone, my name is Grace Piper and this past summer I took part in the incredible 4-H opportunity Youth Adventure Camp or YAC. Youth adventure camp is a four-day three-night camp that is run by Ontario 4-H facilitators and takes place at a different camp each year. This past year camp took place at camp Winnebago in Huntsville Ontario. The camp is specifically for 4-H youth in Ontario between the ages of 12-15 who want to learn about leadership, teamwork, goal setting, and problem solving in a safe and exciting environment with other youth their age. Tonight, I will be sharing my own personal experience at Youth Adventure Camp and how it has benefited me. I will also attempt to not bore you to death as just saw about half of you look to the door with longing in your eyes.

When I first signed up for Youth Adventure Camp, I was very nervous as I had never been to a sleep away camp or taken part in a 4-H opportunity like this one. However, I became less nervous and more excited as the time for camp came closer and I received more information about what to expect and pack for camp. When the first day of camp finally arrived my parents and I packed up the car and made the four-hour trip up to Huntsville. Looking back on it now, I wish I had taken the charter bus that was offered at the time of registration. Not only does it save money but it allows time to get to know the people you will be spending the next four days with. and after four hours in the car with me, who loves to talk on normal days and double when I'm nervous, I think my parents were wishing they spent the 80\$ for the bus too.

When I arrived at camp around 2:30 I was greeted by two of the 4-H facilitators and given a name tag. One of the first things they tell you is that you must protect your name tag with your life. On your name tag which is attached to a certain colour of lanyard is your first and last name, the county you're from, the cabin you're in, an animal sticker, a smiley face sticker and a fruit. After I received my name tag, I waited for a few other people to arrive and then I was shown to my cabin by two different facilitators. Once I got into my cabin, I chose my bunk and set my things down before I was brought back outside and taken to a main field in the middle of the camp where I met the rest of the campers. I joined in the icebreaker games they were already playing as I arrived towards the end of the drop off time and the charter bus had already gotten there. After a few icebreaker games we were called by cabin down to the water for our swim tests. This was a good time to meet our cabin mates and find out where they were from. The swim test consisted of us swimming from one side of an enclosed area of the lake to the other and back. I would say it was probably 50 metres. We swam in our cabin groups all at once and had no time limit. We were also able to use any type of swimming stroke we wanted to. After that we had a chance to catch our breath before going to another enclosed area and treading water for two minutes. If we were successful in doing both those things, we were given red wristbands to indicate we had passed the swim test. However, the wristbands became a little irrelevant as we found out everyone had passed the swim test. After that we went back to our cabin to change into our regular clothes. Then we headed back to the lawn to play more games while we waited for everyone else to finish their tests.

Next, we were put into groups based on our animal sticker on our name tags and headed down to the dining hall. We lined up in front of the dining hall in our groups. Before every meal for the rest of camp we would be sorted into groups based on the three stickers we had, randomly, with our cabin or sometimes we would get to choose. The dining hall was set up with big long picnic tables that fit 10-11 people which were how many people were in each group. That night the meal was spaghetti and meatballs. Throughout the four days we had a variety of other food like fried chicken and mashed potatoes with grilled vegetables, soup, pancakes, eggs, toast, and on the last night we had a cookout with burgers, sausage, curly fries and juice. On the last morning we had a big buffet style brunch with lunch and breakfast foods. After dinner we had dessert which was a chocolate lava cake and it was delicious. We got dessert after both lunch and dinner for the next three days as well.

After dinner we would head down to the theatre or somewhere else around camp and play fun games. My favourite one we played was clothespin tag. On the last night there was a camp wide talent show that along with the YAC campers and facilitators some of the Camp Winnebago staff took part in. There was soccer, there was magic, there was square dancing, there was harmonica, there was piano and there was probably the worst performance of single lady's that I have ever seen. There was also an extremely dangerous game involving balloons and staples guns that I won't go into detail about.

YAC report continued--

After we would have an awesome campfire or the second night we got to just hang out in the theatre and play games. That night I learned 2 things 1) I'm a natural at the game spoons and 2) some people just don't have the raw talent for spoons that I do.

In the mornings we got the opportunity to take part in a polar plunge which was one of my favourite parts. Overall, the water was my favourite part of camp. Which is the moment I have been most excited about. The lake we were on was separated into an area of open water and a boardwalk with different sections like where we took our swim tests. In the biggest area there was a GIANT inflatable slide that had a landing within it you could jump off of, an inflatable trampoline and an inflatable volleyball court. All the inflatable things were connected by inflatable walkways which were so much fun just on their own. Now I am not exaggerating when I say I genuinely believe playing on those inflatables was the most fun I have ever had in my entire life. There was also a dock that you could jump off of but I personally didn't enjoy it that much because it made me feel like my head was going to disconnect from my body every time, I hit the water. We had the opportunity to play on these inflatables during our adventure stations after lunch each day or during delicate determination time after adventure stations if the group we were in didn't get to go down to the water.

Our adventure station groups were determined by the smiley face sticker on our lanyard and the first day 2 smiley face groups would do land activities and the other would do water activities then the next day they would flop. Land activities consisted of archery, high ropes and rock climbing. The water activities were paddle boarding or kayaking, canoeing, and playing on the inflatables. The other big aspect of camp was the different stations. At these stations we took part in different activities that helped us learn about goal setting, leadership skills, teamwork, problem solving and communication. We would be split into groups to go to these stations based on the colour of our name tag lanyards. We would do this after breakfast and before lunch. Some of the things we would do in these groups were obstacle courses, blindfolded challenges, puzzles, life sized board games, drawings and frisbee throwing. My favourite activity we did at one of these stations was building a tent blind folded. It was especially interesting for me as I've never built a tent before so now, I feel more confident constructing one blind than I do with vision.

One thing that made my time at camp very enjoyable was the actual camp we were at. Camp Winnebago was beautiful and had amazing basketball, pickleball and tennis courts, a big lawn with a baseball diamond and a gorgeous dining hall. The cabins were very big and had very sturdy bunks. There was a lot of storage and a bathroom with 2 toilets in the cabin. There were also shower houses that were very modern and had very warm water. All the water at the camp was safe to drink other than the water from the lake of course. Overall, I think it was a great venue and it really added to the camp experience.

The last day of camp was bittersweet as we were all sad to leave. We were given camp t-shirts and a few other goodies before we left and took the last 20 minutes of camp to sign each other's t-shirts. We had a big brunch on the last day as well and said goodbye to all the facilitators and staff.

Youth adventure camp helped me step out of my comfort zone, become more confident, and make new friends. It helped with starting high school as it eased me back into a learning environment in a fun way and being in such a positive environment made me more comfortable and outgoing. At camp I made friends from all over Ontario that have the same interests and hobbies as me which is something I will cherish forever. So, when January comes around and the Resource Guide comes out, if you're between the ages of 12-15 please be sure to register for Youth Adventure Camp and I promise you, you will come back from camp with lifetime memories and new skills.
